



The Japanese authorities who interrogate Pi refuse to believe his story and press him to tell them the truth. After hours of coercion, Pi tells a second story, a story much less fantastical, much more conventional--but is it more true?




The Book Thief

• It is 1939. In Nazi Germany, the country is holding its breath. Death has never been busier - and will become busier still.



But these are dangerous times, and when Liesel's foster family hides a Jew in their basement, nothing will ever be the same again




Five Feet Apart

Six feet apart. No exceptions.

The Librarian of Auschwitz: based on the incredible true story of Dita Kraus



And so Dita becomes the secret librarian of Auschwitz, responsible for the safekeeping of the small collection of titles, as well as the 'living books' prisoners of Auschwitz who know certain books so well, they too can be 'borrowed' to educate the children in the camp.
- But books are extremely dangerous. They make people think. And nowhere are they more dangerous than in Block 31 of Auschwitz, the children's block, where the slightest transgression can result in execution, no matter how young the transgressor...


Enter Jude McGregor. Jude teaches Callie about her real family history, and the more she learns the more he persuades her where her loyalties really lie.


Small Great Things

What the nurse, her lawyer and the father of the child cannot know is how this death will irrevocably change all of their lives, in ways both expected and not.




The Kite Runner

A Thousand Splendid Suns



The Henna Wars



As the competition heats up, Nishat has a decision to make: stay in the closet for her family, or put aside her differences with Flávia and give their relationship a chance.






Hitler's Canary


Speechless


Guantanamo Boy




The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind


A Long Walk to Water: Based on a True Story




Beyond the Break


